Get Back... to Jesus

A few months ago, I had the opportunity to see whol consider to be one of the greatest songwriters and most influential cultural figures of the 20th and 21st centuries, Paul McCartney, perform in Pittsburgh. It was an incredible evening. For nearly three hours, McCartney played 35 songs (not bad for an 83-year-old man). The night was filled with hit after hit, spanning his time with *Wings* and, of course, *The Beatles*. Few musicians have a catalog of music as deep and beloved as his (apologies to Taylor Swift fans).

In preparation for the concert, I came across a quote from McCartney that stayed with me. Reflecting on his time with The Beatles, he once said:

“The Beatles were always about optimism and love. We really believed love could save the world.”

At first glance, this sounds like a bold, perhaps even radical, claim. Can love really save the world? What does that kind of love even look like in practice?

As we journey through the season of Lent, the Church proclaims that the answer is **yes**, there is a love that saves. For forty days leading up to Easter, we focus our hearts and lives on the love that saves humanity from sin, the love revealed to us in Jesus Christ.


Throughout his life and ministry, Jesus embodied a love unlike anything the world had known. He drew near to those others avoided. He healed the sick and restored the broken. He offered grace and forgiveness freely, even to those who misunderstood or rejected him. And in one of the most profound moments in Scripture, while nailed to the cross, Jesus prayed, *“Father, forgive them, for they do not know what they are doing”* (Luke 23:34). This is the love that rescues, restores, and saves. The beautiful thing about this love is that it is ongoing and available to us today.

In this sense, McCartney and The Beatles were on to something. Love truly can save the world. As Christians, however, we celebrate not an abstract idea of love, but the very real, self-giving love of Jesus Christ. We celebrate a love that conquered sin and death and opened the way to new life.

This Lent, I invite us as a church to reflect on what it might look like to live out the kind of radical love Jesus proclaimed and practiced. Specifically, I ask: *How can Trinity United Presbyterian Church in Uniontown, Pennsylvania, embody this love in our worship, our service, and in our daily lives?*

This Lent, we are reminded that love finds its truest and fullest expression in Christ. May this season draw us back to Jesus, and to the love that truly saves the world.

Notes From The Bench

As I continue settling into my new role as organist here at Trinity UPC, I want to begin with a word of genuine gratitude. Your kindness, encouragement, and patience have been a steady grace as I learn the rhythms of this congregation. It is a gift to serve a church that values worship so deeply and supports the musicians who help lead it.

We are just coming off the exhilarating intensity of Advent—a season that is anything but quiet.

Advent music watches and waits, but it also aches with expectation, echoing the cry of the prophets: “O that you would tear open the heavens and come down” (Isaiah 64:1).

No sooner do we arrive at Christmas, however, than the church calendar keeps pressing forward. For the music staff at Trinity, the train never stops moving, because the story never stops unfolding.

Part of my role as a sacred musician is to help attend carefully to these seasonal shifts and to translate them into sound. Sacred music does not simply decorate worship; it interprets it.

In Advent, we sing our longing and hope—music shaped by promise rather than fulfillment (Romans 8:24–25). At Christmas, that longing gives way to proclamation: “The Word became flesh and lived among us” (John 1:14). Carols like Joy to the World are not sentimental celebrations but bold theological statements, announcing that Christ’s reign reaches “far as the curse is found” (cf. Genesis 3; Romans 5:18).

As we move into Epiphany, the music widens our lens still further. This is the season of revelation, of light breaking outward. The church sings not only that Christ is born, but that Christ is revealed to the nations (Matthew 2:1–12). Hymns such as As with Gladness Men of Old give musical voice to the truth that the gospel is expansive and radiant: “Arise, shine; for your light has come, and the glory of the Lord has risen up on you” (Isaiah 60:1).

This is work we undertake together as a church family. Trinity’s choirs, Instrumentalists, pulpit supply, and congregation all participate in shaping worship that is thoughtful, prayerful, and spiritually nourishing. Week after week, sacred music helps bind scripture, prayer, and proclamation into a single act of praise, forming us over time through beauty, repetition, and truth (Colossians 3:16).

On a more practical note, our winter organ and piano tunings have recently taken place, and we are grateful for our technicians -- Ray Colby and Dan Alberts -- who care for these instruments.



Looking ahead, I am also delighted to share that applications for a newly refreshed Summer

Organ Scholar program will be opening very soon. I am grateful to continue this program that my predecessor, Brett Vanderlaan, shepherded into fruition, and I look forward to supporting young musicians as they learn to serve the church through their gifts.

Thank you for singing, listening, and worshipping so faithfully. I am always glad to visit and answer questions during the coffee hour each week, and I look forward to continuing this journey of worship together.





Over the coming month, the youth will continue this exploration by learning what the Trinity is and what it is not, while also reflecting on God's omnipotence, omnipresence, and omniscience, and how God operates with one will and purpose through the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit.

Because of the faith, service, and dedication of these teenagers, it is truly a special time to be part of the Youth Group at Trinity Presbyterian Church.


